Housing and Planning Committee Meeting Backup: December 2, 2025. What is Imagine Austin?

Imagine Austin is a 30-year plan that is required by Article X of the City's Charter.

It seeks for Austin to be a city of "Complete" Communities" where people of all backgrounds and income levels can build a career, make a home, and find happiness near the people and places they love.

The plan serves as a roadmap guiding investments, infrastructure, and decisionmaking across the city for decades to come.



Project Goals



- City Council approved a resolution to update Imagine Austin on August 28, 2025.
- In response, the overall project **goals** include:
 - Stay relevant and aligned with the community's current goals and priorities.
 - Reflect present-day conditions and anticipate future realities.
 - Develop a robust and action-oriented implementation framework that guides City actions.
 - Provide clear guidance for infrastructure and public investments.
 - Create consistent and regular opportunities to engage with the community and align with evolving needs.
 - Develop a Place Types Map to support holistic planning across the City.


Purpose and Progress



- A March 2024 Interlocal Agreement between Austin City Council and Travis County Commissioner's Court called for a collaborative Northeast District Plan.
- The Northeast Planning District, the geographic area for the plan, encompasses 30 square miles, with one-third County jurisdiction and two-thirds City jurisdiction.
- The purpose of the collaborative effort is to address historic inequities and disparities through cohesive plan implementation.
- Since March 2024, City and County staff have formed the 14-member staff Working Group.
 - The Working Group has held 31 meetings and completed the first deliverable the Working Group Charter.
- The second deliverable, the Summary Report of Existing Conditions, is being completed by the City's land use consultant and is expected to be finalized in December 2025.

Next Steps



- Continue developing the CAC charge, design, and selection process (2026).
 - The design and structure of the CAC is being informed by five key stakeholder groups listed in the ILA.
- Present the CAC charge, design, and selection process to Commissioner's Court for approval (2026).
- Present the engagement consultant scope to Commissioner's Court for approval (2026).
- Post the RFP for the engagement consultant (2026).
- Finalize and report the Short-Term Project List implementation timeline to the Working Group (*City only*) (Dec 2025).
- Implement one identified short-term project (City only) (Feb May 2026).

Purpose and Goals




- A 2024 Council Resolution directed staff to renew the vision for the Downtown Austin Plan.
- Staff is proceeding with the Downtown Austin Plan update as a District Plan that also includes the South Central Waterfront and University of Texas/University Neighborhood Overlay (UNO) areas. Planning efforts include:
 - Developing a Vision Plan and action-oriented Implementation Plan for the Central City District.
 - Engaging community members and stakeholders that live, work, and play in these areas.
 - Inviting underrepresented voices to participate.
 - Aligning area plans with citywide policies and strategies, including the *Imagine Austin* Comprehensive Plan.
 - Bringing the Vision Plan and Implementation Plan before Council for adoption by December 2026.

Early 2000s

 City Council adopted the Downtown Design Guidelines, Great Streets Plan Standards, and Great Streets Development Program.

2003

City Council dedicated a portion of the parking meter revenue to Great Streets.

2014

- City Council established Great Streets as a **Downtown Density Bonus Program gatekeeper** requirement.
- An Update to the Great Streets Plan and Standards is needed.
- The Update includes an existing conditions analysis.

- July to November 2025
- Gather feedback from residents, employees, and visitors about how they experience downtown streets and what they would like to see moving forward
- Our outreach included:
 - Online survey 328 participants
 - Open house 75 attendees
 - Stakeholder meetings
 - Imagine Austin Speaker Series Event
- Almost 1,000 comments from all engagement
- This input will form the recommendations for the Update and define the priorities, challenges, and shared values that will guide future enhancements.





20 Themes



What We've Heard: Emerging Themes

- Over 600 open-ended survey comments were analyzed and grouped into recurring themes that reflected what survey respondents value most about downtown streets.
- From these patterns, Urban Design distilled 20 community themes into six core values:
 - People first
 - Vibrant public life
 - Shade and comfort
 - Safety and inclusive design
 - Seamless connectivity
 - Clean and enduring design


