SUBJECT: Update on High School Summer Internship Program

The purpose of this memorandum is to provide an update on the High School Summer Internship Program (SIP), administered by the Youth Initiatives team, under the Workforce Development and Child Care Division of the Economic Development Department. Program outcomes are described below with additional programmatic data detailed in **Appendix 1**.

Background

Since 2013, the Youth Initiatives team has partnered with Bank of America to increase teen employment in Austin, strengthen local economies, and invest in the future workforce.

In 2025, SIP received 717 applications and employed 190 interns, ages 15–18, at \$13.00 an hour for 20 hours a week over a six-week period. Interns participated across five program areas aligned with career field, discipline, skill, and interest:

- 1. Emerging Leaders
- 2. Get Ready! STEAM
- 3. Entrepreneurial/Automotive
- 4. Aviation
- 5. Austin Convention Center (Due to construction, no interns were placed in Summer 2025)

A total of 68 host sites across the city provided internship placements (Appendix 2).

Eligibility required applicants to be City of Austin residents, ages 15–18, currently enrolled in high school, and available for the full program duration. Interns represented all 10 Council Districts and 39 schools (public, private, charter, and homeschool). Of these, 15% attended Title 1 schools, with an additional 4% qualifying for free or reduced lunch at non-Title 1 schools (**Appendix 1** provides detailed demographic data).

Implementation

Recruitment began in fall 2024 and continued through spring 2025, with applications closing at the end of February 2025. All eligible applicants were guaranteed interviews, and more than 500 were

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> interviewed by City staff and volunteers. Interns that are not accepted are placed on a waiting list. Placement decisions considered both proximity and career interest.

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Each site was vetted for safety and compliance before the program began and again at the midpoint. Interns also participated in two Leadership Days featuring a speaker series with local professionals, a field trip to Canva Headquarters, workshops by the Texas Department of Public Safety, and a "Dressing for Success" panel in partnership with the Austin Convention Center Department.

The program concluded on July 11, 2025, with a ceremony at Austin City Hall, where interns were honored in Council Chambers and received Certificates of Achievement signed by the Mayor and City Council.

Next Steps

- Expand outreach in Title 1 schools and communities serving historically underrepresented Austin youth.
- Broaden the range of participating host sites, with emphasis on South, Southwest, Southeast, North, and Northwest Austin.
- Explore additional funding partnerships to increase the number of intern placements and provide administrative support as the program continues to grow.

Bank of America, in partnership with Opportunity Austin, currently funds up to \$120,000 annually for intern wages, with the City of Austin covering the remaining balance. Sustaining and expanding the program will require additional resources to meet rising demand.
