- Authority and Provider Roles
















Certified Community Behavioral Health Clinic (CCBHC)

- In addition to being a Local Mental Health Authority,
 Integral Care is also a Certified Community Behavioral
 Health Clinic (CCBHC).
- CCBHC is a model of care designed to ensure access to coordinated comprehensive behavioral health care across the system of care.
- Integral Care was first certified as a CCBHC in 2016. As of March 2022, all 39 LMHA's in Texas have achieved CCBHC certification.
- Just as hospitals and healthcare organizations can seek
 Joint Commission accreditation, all non-profit health
 centers are eligible to achieve CCBHC certification through
 meeting certain quality of care criteria.



Over half of all children and adolescents served by integral Care in FY24 had a traines related disorder, such as adjustment disorder and/or PTSD.



Comorbidities

In FY24, 59% of clients with an anxiety disorder had a comorbid depressive disorder, while 1 in 3 had comorbid Post-Traumatic Stress Disorder.




§8% of clients with schizophrenia spectrum disorders had a co-occurring substance use diagnosis.



Where Clients Reside – FY24


- Heat mapping of clients served in FY24





Research Study Findings for 911 Call Center

Integral Care's Mental Health Professionals at the 911 Call Center successfully diverted non-criminal behavioral health calls—reducing strain on police, improving public safety outcomes and getting people the right care at the right time.

Program Scope & Results (2019–2025)

- 21,000+ calls analyzed
- 83–87% of diverted calls resolved without police
- 316–682 POEDs, 50–110 arrests,
 7,200–14,000 officer hours averted

Improved Outcomes*

Reductions in:

- **44–62**% Emergency Detentions (POEDs)
- **4 37–58**% Arrests
- ↓ 56% Use of Force (as-treated analysis)
- **4 26 min** Officer Time on Scene







Homeless Health and Wellness:

- This program provides intensive care coordination to individuals with the highest needs and greatest vulnerability on DACC's waitlist for Intensive Case Management and those identified and referred by the HOST team.
- Contract ends: 12/31/2025
- Funding amount: \$541,714

Therapeutic Diversion Program

- Specialty Shelter for justice-involved individuals.
- Contract ends: 9/30/2025
- Funding amount: \$2,000,000

Expanded Mobile Crisis Outreach Team

- Expanded services include 24/7 availability for in-person crisis assessments and co-response with APD and EMS.
- Contract ends: 9/30/2025
- Funding amount: \$1,460,340
