

1 **RESOLUTION NO.**

2 **WHEREAS**, opioid overdose is a major public health crisis in the United
3 States and affects countless individuals, families, and communities, including the
4 City; and

5 **WHEREAS**, during an opioid overdose brain damage can occur after 4
6 minutes without breathing and death can occur 4-6 minutes later; and

7 **WHEREAS**, Naloxone is also referred to as “Narcan”, the brand name for
8 the nasal spray naloxone, is safe, easy to administer, and has an exceptionally high
9 safety profile with a shelf life ranging from 24 months to 36 months, and is highly
10 effective at reversing opioid overdoses; and

11 **WHEREAS**, Narcan (Naloxone) is a life-saving medication that can reverse
12 an opioid overdose and is an essential tool for Emergency Medical Services (EMS)
13 to have at their disposal; and

14 **WHEREAS**, timely administration of Narcan by EMS can significantly
15 increase the chances of survival for individuals experiencing an opioid overdose;
16 and

17 **WHEREAS**, Narcan is a proven and effective tool that EMS has used in the
18 City to save lives and access to Narcan resources are critical for the continued
19 success of EMS efforts to address opioid overdose in the City; and

20 **WHEREAS**, the EMS inventory of Narcan is currently dependent on a
21 third-party grant, and the supply and pricing of the product is not independently
22 contracted by the City; and

23 **WHEREAS**, Council passed Resolution No. 20220616-053 on June 16th,
24 2022, addressing the opioid crisis and providing direction to explore harm
25 reduction strategies including increased access to and supply of Naloxone; **NOW**,
26 **THEREFORE**,

27 **BE IT RESOLVED BY THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF AUSTIN:**

28 The City Manager is directed to ensure that EMS, or other appropriate
29 departments, has consistent and reliable funding for the acquisition of opioid
30 overdose reversal medication, such as opioid antagonists like Naloxone, for staff to
31 use to assist persons in the community at risk of an opioid-related drug overdose
32 and for distribution to community partners and Narcan training to local business
33 owners in areas where opioid use is the highest and return to Council with a Fiscal
34 Year 2022-2023 budget amendment and any necessary instruments needed to
35 accomplish that goal.

36 **BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED:**

37 The City Manager is directed to explore having EMS, or other appropriate
38 departments, distribute opioid overdose reversal medication, such as opioid
39 antagonists like Naloxone, and related personal protective equipment and training
40 to business owners, or other appropriate persons at the business, that are in a
41 position to assist individuals at risk of an opioid-related drug overdose due to the
42 proximity of their business to hot-spots for opioid use for their use to assist such
43 at-risk persons and return to Council with budget recommendations and a proposed
44 funding mechanism to accomplish that goal during the Fiscal Year 2023-2024
45 budget adoption.

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47 **BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED:**

48 The City Manager is directed to return to the Public Safety Committee with
49 a progress report regarding Naloxone funding and resources no later than July
50 28th, 2023.

51 **BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED:**

52 The City Manager is directed to explore and consider opportunities to place
53 Narcan and opioid kits in any recommended City-owned buildings inside
54 automated external defibrillators' compartments or within their own compartment.
