# Posting Language

Authorize a contract to provide access to capacity building programs for nonprofits for Austin Public Health with Catchafire, Inc., for an initial term of one year with up to four, one-year extension options, in an amount not to exceed \$465,000. Funding: \$31,000 is available in the Fiscal Year 2024-2025 Operating Budget of Austin Public Health.

# Additional Backup Information:

The contract will facilitate capacity building services for nonprofits. The capacity building program connects nonprofits with volunteers who possess expertise in areas such as policy development, human resources, data analytics, communications, web development, and more.

The program also offers professional development resources, including webinars, articles, and networking opportunities designed specifically for nonprofits. These services help ensure equitable access to talent and resources for agencies funded by or seeking funding from the City, addressing challenges associated with limited budgets or staffing. Additionally, the program provides detailed data on user engagement, enabling Austin Public Health to better evaluate and meet the needs of these agencies.

This contract will replace a contract which expired on May 1, 2025. The recommended contractor is the previous provider of these services. The requested authorization amount was determined based upon the

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contractor's pricing for the requested services.

If the City is unable to secure a contract, area nonprofit agencies would lose access to these capacity building resources.
